CIVICS – Course Expectations Wheeler High School, Social Studies Department

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Course Description

Half Year - .5 Credit

This **State of Connecticut required course for graduation** provides contemporary knowledge of the United States Constitution and how the rules of law and values of liberty and equality impact individual, local, state and national decisions. Emphasis will be placed on the rights and responsibilities of citizens and their relationship with the national, state, and local governments. The course will also explore how world affairs affect citizens' lives and the well-being of their community, state, and nation.

Units of Study*

- Foundation of American Citizenship
- The United States Constitution
- The National Government
- Political Parties and the Election Process
- State and Local Government

Essential Questions/Themes for the course:

- o Explain what it means to be a citizen of the United States.
- o Evaluate the obligations and responsibilities of citizens.
- o Explain how a government works to balance the rights of the individual with the overall wellbeing of the society.
- o Evaluate how laws both shape and reflect characteristics of American society.
- o Evaluate how political parties both shape and reflect political, economic, and social interests.
- o Explain the factors that influence voter participation, and how new technologies influence elections, voting, and voter behaviors.
- o Explore the relationship of the U.S. to other nations and to world affairs.

Course Materials

Course Organization

Class will be a combination of lecture, discussion, and group work. In addition to homework, written responses, and announced tests and quizzes, there will also be unannounced reading quizzes, essays, research projects, graded discussions, and presentations.

Grading

Assignments will be graded through a points system, as follows* (point values are per assignment):

- Homework/Classwork 10
- Ouizzes 50
- Tests/Projects/Essays 100 points each.
- Town Meeting summary and analysis** 40

**Students are required to attend a minimum of <u>two</u> town meetings (Board of Education, Board of Finance, Board of Selectman, Town-wide meeting, to name a few) during the semester. An assignment sheet with directions for attending these meeting will be distributed early in the semester.

Grades will be updated weekly on PowerSchool. Keep in mind that I rarely offer "extra credit" assignments. [Please see WHS's policy regarding Academic Integrity on pages 21 - 22 in the Student Handbook.]

Late Work Policy

All assignments are due in class on the assigned due date. Late work can be handed in for <u>half</u> credit no more than 2 days after the due date. <u>After two days, late work will not be accepted.</u> There will be no exceptions to this rule except in genuine emergencies.

Essays and Projects are penalized 10% every day that they are late.

Absences

If you miss class for any reason (illness, fieldtrip, etc.), it is your responsibility to find out what you missed in class. If you know in advance that you are going to miss class, you should talk to me before your absence to help ensure a smoother return to class.

Missed work due to an absence must be completed within a responsible amount of time upon your return to school. It is your responsibility to schedule make-up work. If missed work is not completed within a responsible amount of time, you will receive a zero for the assignment. Make up assessments such as tests and quizzes may be in a different format from the original assessment to protect the integrity of the assessment. When you schedule to make up the assignment, I will alert you to any changes in format. Additionally, because some class assignments are impossible to replicate, they will be altered so that you can receive a grade for the assignment.
